Collection consists of letters, legal documents, diaries, notebooks genealogical materials of the Lloyd family of Philadelphia, plus a group of papers [7 items] connected with the Hogan Schism at St. Mary's Church, Phila., 1821-1828. The main bulk of the collection is concerned with the activities of Thomas Lloyd, b. 1756, d. 1827, who fought in the American revolution, became stenographer to the first U.S. House of Representatives, taught shorthand and published a book about it, as well as publishing the transcript of a number of trials which he recorded. He went to London in 1791, fell into debt and other troubles, and was imprisoned in Newgate Prison, 1794-1796, after which he returned to the United States.

Collection also includes letters from William Lloyd, father of Thomas, a builder in London; Mary [Carson] Lloyd, b. 1762, wife of Thomas; Robert Carson, b. ca. 1774, d. 1796, her brother, and correspondence of the four daughters of Thomas and Mary: Elizabeth, b. 1781; Hannah Biddle, b. 1787; Mary, b. 1784, d. ca. 1867, and Jane Abel [Lloyd] Rudolph, b. 1790.

Also, correspondence and miscellaneous papers about the Lloyds collected by Martin I. J. Griffin, b. 1842, d. 1911, plus manuscripts and reprints of articles about Thomas Lloyd, notably one by Griffin, published in the Records of the American Catholic Historical Society, 1889, and materials collected by Griffin about the memorial to Thomas Lloyd erected in the graveyard of St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church, Phila., 1903.
