		1. Sept. 8, 1828, Philadelphia, from James Spenceley Request for help for his son. 1 page.
		2. Jan. 2, 1831, St. Francis Monastery, Cambria Co., PA from Bro. Thomas. Rejection from the monastery of Peter Rogers who was recommended by Rev. Reilly. 1 page.
		3. Aug. 15, 1841, New York City, from Edw. O'Neill. Recommendation of a Prof. Ryan for a Professor's position at St. Mary's. 1 page.
		4. Feb. 26, 1845, Jasper Co., Illinois, from C. O'Donnell Writer is attempting to settle in the town of St. Marie but is having difficulties due to a Mr. Picquet who controls the land around the town. 3 pages.
		5. March 16, 1846, Wilmington, Delaware, from Mrs. J. Bickta. Mrs. Bickta chastised her son for playing hooky from school. 1 page.
		6. March 17, 1846, from Fr. Reilly's sister, Mrs. Dos Santos. A poem about St. Patrick sent to Fr. Reilly on St. Patrick's Day. 2 pages.
		7. March 17, 1846, Milltown, Ireland. From John Reilly (Fr. Reilly's uncle). Letter, written by a friend, John McCabe, describes the hardships during the potato famine in Ireland.
		8. Aug. 6, 1846, Milltown, Ireland. From John Reilly, (Fr. Reilly's uncle). Follow-up correspondence of item 7. Writer thanks Fr. Reilly for letter and he goes on talking about family problems.
		. A note was added by Charles O'Riley, R.C.E. of Drumlane and certified that Fr. Reilly's money (2 pounds was received) 3 pages.
		9. Nov. 6, 1846, Milltown, Ireland. From John Reilly (Fr. Reilly's uncle). Letter written for John Reilly by John McCabe. John Reilly thanks his nephew for writing a second time and he requests more family news.
		. An added note from P. O'Donegane (?) stating that John Reilly is a poor man and an object of charity. 3 pages.

Reilly on some legal process being conducted by the writer. 1 page.</p> <p>12. Jan. 16, 1847. From L. McGuthrie. See item 1 above. Writer finds record of judgement. 1 page.</p> <p>13. Feb. 21, 1847, Glasslough. From - name is illegible (a priest). Vouches for Wm. McKenna and states that McKenna was unjustly accused of prosecution, conviction and transportation of Fr. Hanlin. 1 page.</p> <p>14. April 17, 1847, Mt. St. Mary. From James Cullen. Submission of personal data and awaiting orders from Bishop. 1 page.</p> <p>15. April 24, 1847, Milltown, Ireland. From Mrs. Fitzpatrick. Written for Mrs. Fitzpatrick by John McCabe. Fr. Reilly's uncle, John Reilly, is dead and problems have been encountered in his burial. 3 pages.</p>

1	2	Oct. 1, 1847 - Jan. 10, 1850 - 17 items
		1. Oct. 1, 1847, Baltimore. From Fr. John Scanlon. The writer, a former teacher at St. Mary's, has a more lucrative assignment but is very unhappy. Strongly requests Fr. Reilly to relieve him as a teacher. Note: Stationary has picture of Baltimore harbor with description of city in unusual small typing. 4 pages.
		2. June 26, 1848, Baltimore. From E.A. Coffield. Writer requests that, since he has to go to the mountains for his health, his son is kept at St. Mary's for a few weeks instead of starting his vacation. 1 page.
		3. June 26, 1848, Washington. John W. Hou--- (paper has deteriorated). Writer has to decline invitation to commencement due to business pressures. 1 page.
		4. July 11, 1848, Philadelphia. From W. N. McGuire. Writer, unemployed with no money, requests permission to enter St. Mary's. 1 page.
		5. July 24, 1848. From W. W. Haly. Writer is concerned that the administration of his mother's estate is spending money illegally. 2 pages.
		6. Aug. 1, 1848, Rome. From Fr. Lewis Latner. Writer expresses concern that his chemistry training may be inadequate to teach at St. Mary's but, with some help, he will make the grade. In addition, he has salary concerns and recommends another priest to teach languages. 2 pages.
		7. Aug. 8, 1848, Memphis. From Geo. W. Codinie (not very legible). Requests help on some small funeral matters. 4 pages.
		8. Aug. 14, 1848, Charleston. From (illegible) Letter of introduction for a Mrs. Bryce who wants to enroll her sons at St. Mary's. However, writer will be financially responsible. 1 page.
		9. Sept. 23, 1848, New York. From Fr. J. Kelly. Statement that Ann Lynn and her sister are under writer's employment at the Irish emmigration office. 1 page.

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1	2	10. Oct. 2, 1848, Philadelphia. From M. A. Frenaye. Request for assistance to locate a Mr. Lanahon in Wilmington. 1 page.
		11. Feb. 27, 1849, Ballustest, Ireland (?). From Bridget Lawler. Note: Document is badly worn. Writer, having lost all in the Irish depression, requests money for passage to America to start a new life for her and her children. 2 pages.
		12. Mar. 3, 1849, Philadelphia. From W. N. Maonise. (illegible) Request to have his personal articles shipped and that his debt will be paid by his uncle. 1 page.
		13. Aug. 10, 1849. From George Batterbury. The writer, an employee at St. Mary's, expresses repentance and sorrow for his impudence. 1 page.
		14. Sept. 13, 1849, Memphis, Tenn. From Sara Green. Writer pays her bill and sends a brief family status. 2 pages.
		15. Jan. 1, 1859, Wilmington. From Arthur Funcis. A friend who hasn't seen Fr. Reilly for a long time, renews acquaintance. 1 page.
		16. Jan. 10, 1859, Baltimore. From Mrs. Ben Lavender. The writer's son has not been doing well at St. Mary's and wants to leave. The writer is insisting on his remaining at St. Mary's. 2 pages.
		17. Jan. 10, 1859, Philadelphia. From Mrs. A. Silva. Writer is ill and wants to keep the boy at St. Mary's under very strict limitations. 2 pages.

		1. Jan. 12, 1850, From Juan del dios Larringe (illegible) In Spanish. A student's father airs his complaints about St. Mary. 6 pages.
		2. Jan. 18, 1850, Philadelphia. From Mrs. A. Dos Santos (Fr. Reilly's sister). Writer expresses sorrow about the death of a family friend. Writes about others who have or want to send boys to St. Mary. 4 pages.
		3. Jan. 18, 1850, Philadelphia. From Aug. Merino. Written by R. de la Siena. Writer is very displeased with his boy's behavior and sends directions as to limitations on boy's leaving college and spending money. 2 pages.
		4. Feb. 10, 1850, Havana. From Juan de St. Suavey, in Spanish. Father is very concerned that his son is not doing well in school. 2 pages.
		5. Mar. 10, 1850, New York. From Owen Grey. Writer had not received original bill from Fr. Reilly. However, he cannot send money at present but will send money later. 1 page.
		6. Mar. 12, 1850, Charleston. From T. Preston. Writer is concerned with his sons' progress and non-communicative. Suggests that one of the boys be placed under a more difficult teacher to make him work. 1 page.
		7. March 13, 1850. From Wm. Brennan. Letter is badly torn. Writer has one son at St. Mary's but due to financial problems he cannot afford to keep boy at school. However, he offers Fr. Reilly a plan. In addition wants to send another boy to St. Mary. 1 page.
		8. April 15, 1850, Matamoros. From John Bayley. Directs Fr. Reilly as to what Louis Poir is to be taught and why. In addition, directs clothing purchases etc. and defines financial responsibility. 1 page.

Reilly a very harsh letter. In this letter he is contrite, tries to explain his actions, and wants to return to St. Mary's. 3 pages.</p> <p>12. May 29, 1850, Havana. From Maria de los Angeles, Palone de Coronado, in Spanish. Sends data on son's illness, allergies before sending to St. Mary's. 9 pages.</p> <p>13. June 18, 1850, Charleston. From J. Benito de Aranginer, in Spanish. Father wants interview with Fr. Reilly to get more data on St. Mary's before sending son to school. 3 pages.</p> <p>14. July 1, 1850, Charleston. From Augustine Graham. Writer's husband was supposed to go to St. Mary's to pick up son but, due to business, would not; request Fr. Reilly to send son by packet boat. 1 page</p> <p>15. July 1, 1850, Matangas. From Anthony Elms. Writes about 3 boys who will be going to St. Mary's, and he defines what courses they are to follow. One boy, the writer's son, is a sickly boy and the writer feels that the change of climate and environment will help. 1 page.</p> <p>16. July 2, 1850, Havana. From Jose Poey. Letter of introduction for a Mr. J. C. Oxamendi who is removing his brothers from a New York school and will enroll then in St. Mary. 2 pages.</p> <p>17. July 13, 1850, Orizava, Mexico. From Dario Valdez. A former student requests catalogues and school data. He dislikes Mexico very much and wants to improve his English. 1 page.</p>

		1. July 16, 1850, Norfolk, From D. A. Ward. Former student explains why his father has yet to pay his bill. 1 page.
		2. July 18, 1850, Jersey City. From Edw. Roth. The writer, on a trip which includes a seminar at Fordham University, writes about the seminar, of collections for advertisements and a visit to Mr. Bennett of the Herald. 3 pages.
		3. July 19, 1850, Charleston. From D. Graham. Writer sends money and apologies for not visiting Fr. Reilly. In addition, he is very concerned about his son's religious training. 3 pages.
		4. July 19, 1850, Albany. From Edw. Roth. Writes of Albany and its many steeples and churches. He also has problems negotiating southern notes. 3 pages.

		16. August 7, 1850, Havana. From Jose Poey. Writer is pleased with a positive report on a student, Master Oxamendi, and will send another boy to St. Mary's after hurricane season ends. 1 page.

		1. September 15, 1850, Baltimore. From James Carruthers. The writer, who is in the publishing business, requests that St. Mary confer an honorary degree on him. This degree will greatly enhance his prestige in his business. 2 pages.
		2. September 15, 1850, Matanges. From Anthony Ulmo. Writer is very pleased with the progress his sons are making at St. Mary's. 1 page.
		3. September 16, 1850, Baltimore. From J. Soran. Writer is very displeased with his son's education and Fr. Reilly's treatment of the boy and to the writer. Writer will pay no more. 1 page.
		4. September 18, 1850, Philadelphia. From Wm. Burrows. Writing for a Mrs. Hogan, writer suggests that her boy remain at St. Mary's because the mother is in the insane dept. of Pennsylvania hospital and there is no home for the boy. 1 page.
		5. Sept. 20, 1850, Norfolk. From James McGuire. A Mr. Tabb is very bitter towards Fr. Reilly regarding his ward, Master Bird, and the bills sent to Mr. Tabb by Fr. Reilly. The writer has talked to Mr. Tabb to try to mediate the problem. It appears Mr. Tabb now understands and will pay. 3 pages.
